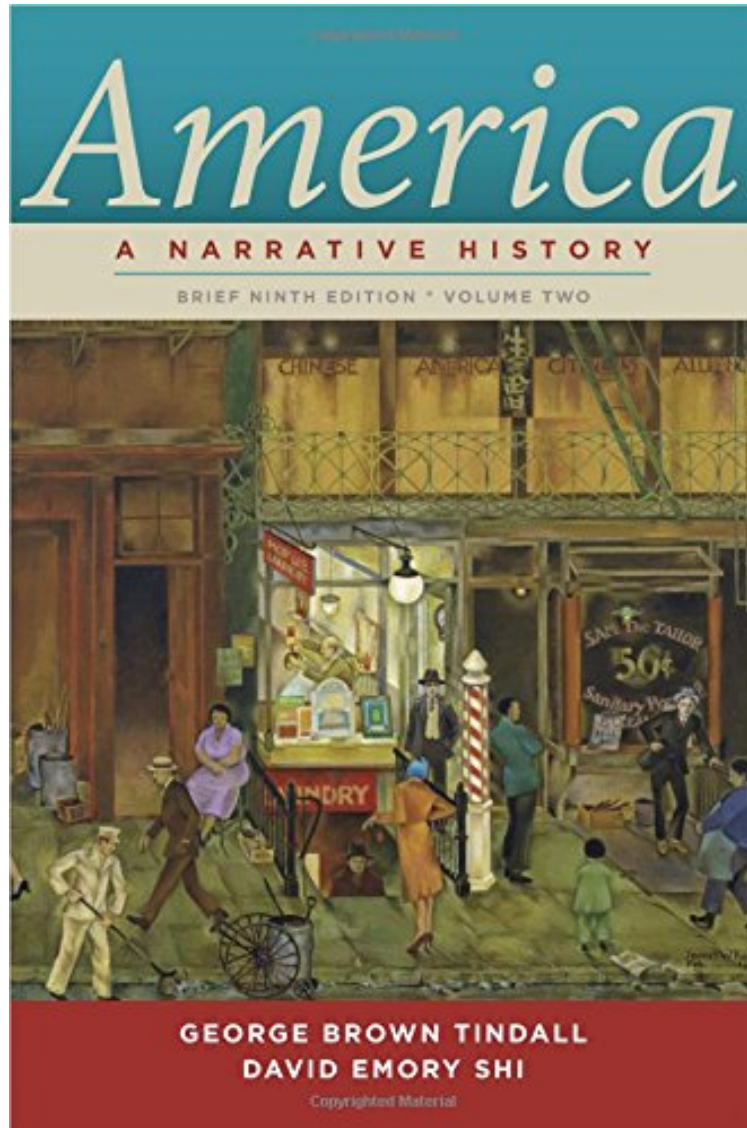

The book came within a week's time with literally no damage to it whatsoever. The book is pretty hefty but it organizes all the content in an easy-to-read way. It's literally like reading a story book... for grown-ups of course. At the beginning of each chapter it gives you an overview to ease you into what's gonna be covered in the

chapter. The sections are nicely divided so it doesn't feel like you're reading a huge book, rather small snippets of stories/historical content. The book has bolded important words, historical dates, and people. Pretty much the whole shebang. At the end of each chapter is a concise chapter summary, a chronology (timeline) to help you see the events in the succession they took place in, a key words list, and other tidbits here and there. I found this super helpful to review my notes and make sure I got all the important information down. I haven't used the online content at all.. mainly because I just haven't had the time or curiosity to see what it has. But I'm assuming it's pretty good too just like the book.
