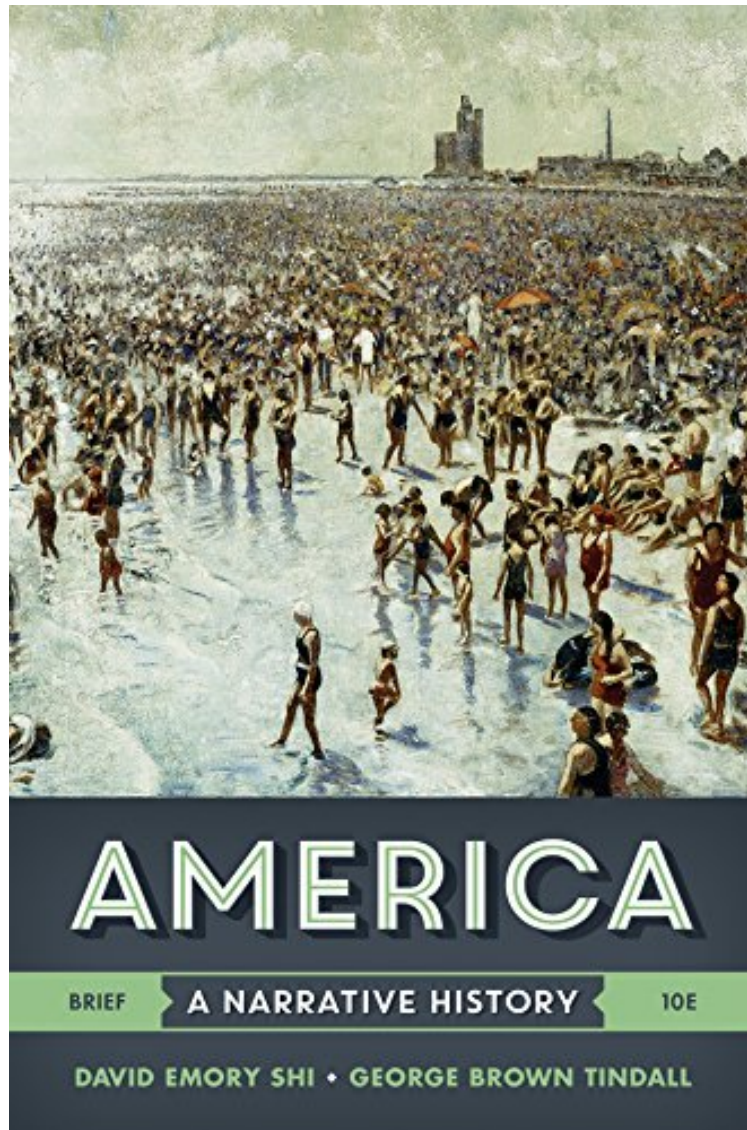

hefty but it organizes all the content in an easy to read way. Its literally like reading a story book... for grown-ups of course. At the beginning of each chapter it gives you an overview to ease you into whats gonna be covered in the chapter. The sections are nicely divided so it doesnt feel like youre reading a huge book, rather small snippets of stories/historical content. The book has bolded important words, historical dates, and people. Pretty much the whole shebang. At the end of each chapter is a concise chapter summary, a chronology (timeline) to help you see the events in the succession they took place in, a key words list, and other tidbits here and there. I found this super helpful to review my notes and make sure I got all the important information down.
