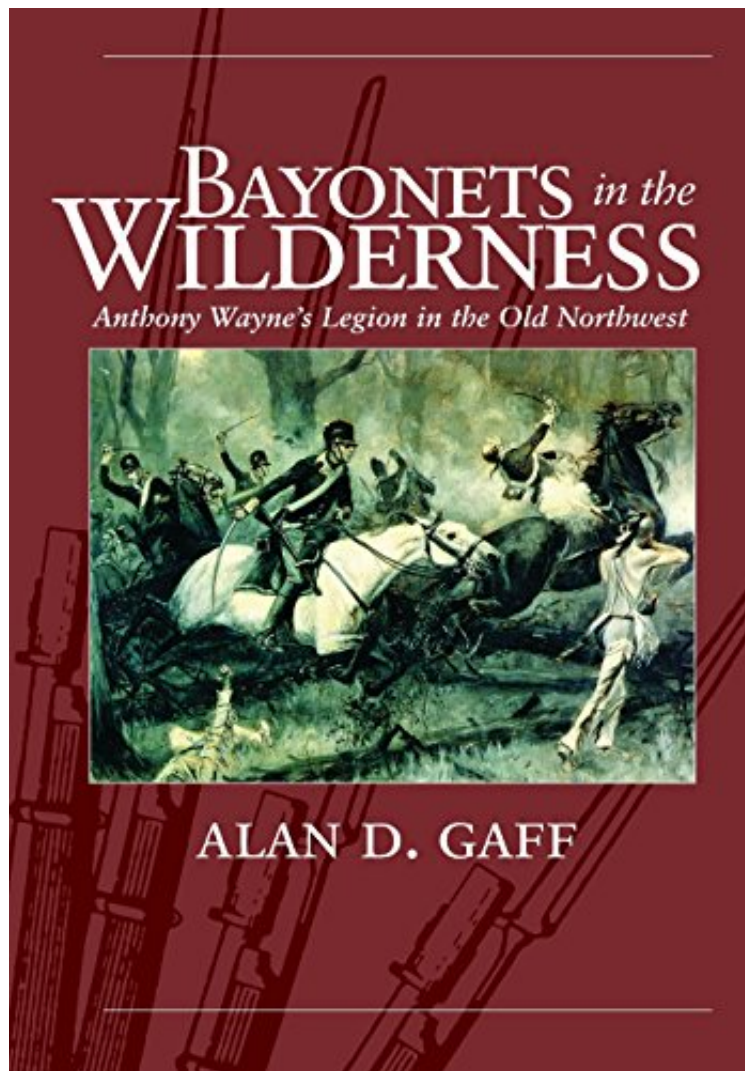

The American Revolution did not end at Yorktown or with the Treaty of Paris. The British still occupied forts in the Northwest Territory in violation of the

treaty of peace and incited the native tribes to oppose the settling of the territory. This book recounts the leadership of General Anthony Wayne in forming an army and leading it against the hostile tribes waging war against us. With the victory at Fallen Timbers the British left the Northwest Territory and halted their support of the hostile tribes. The only downside to the book is the dearth of maps. In *Bayonets in the Wilderness*, Alan D. Gaff explores a long-neglected period in American history to tell the complete story of how the U.S. Army conquered the first American frontier, the Northwest Territory. Wayne's successful campaign led to the creation of a standing army for the country and set the standard for future conflicts and treaties with American Indians. Countering the popular impression of Wayne as mad, Gaff depicts him as a thoughtful, resolute, and diplomatic officer whose masterfully organized campaign brought an end in 1794 to forty years of border fighting. Gaff's account brings to light alliances between Indian forces and the British military, demonstrating that British troops still conducted operations on American soil long after the supposed end of the American Revolution.
