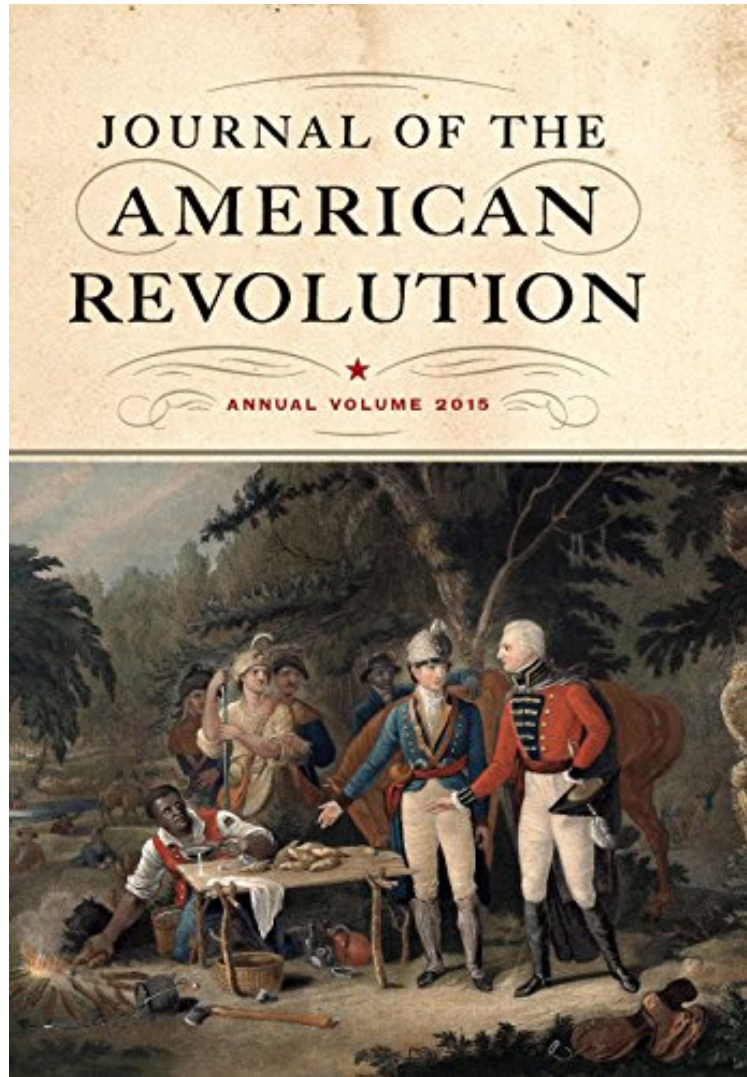

That being said, I have to admit I was disappointed upon receiving the 2015 edition. Oh, the historical information, as noted, is beyond compare, but the previous "Journal" book - for 2014 - has not only the words that brings history to life, but was illustrated with lavish photographs, maps, and paintings that brought the past vividly to my living room and accented the text beautifully. I'm not sure why the 2015 edition wasn't published to that standard (hence the 4 stars instead of 5), but I certainly hope 2016's will be.
