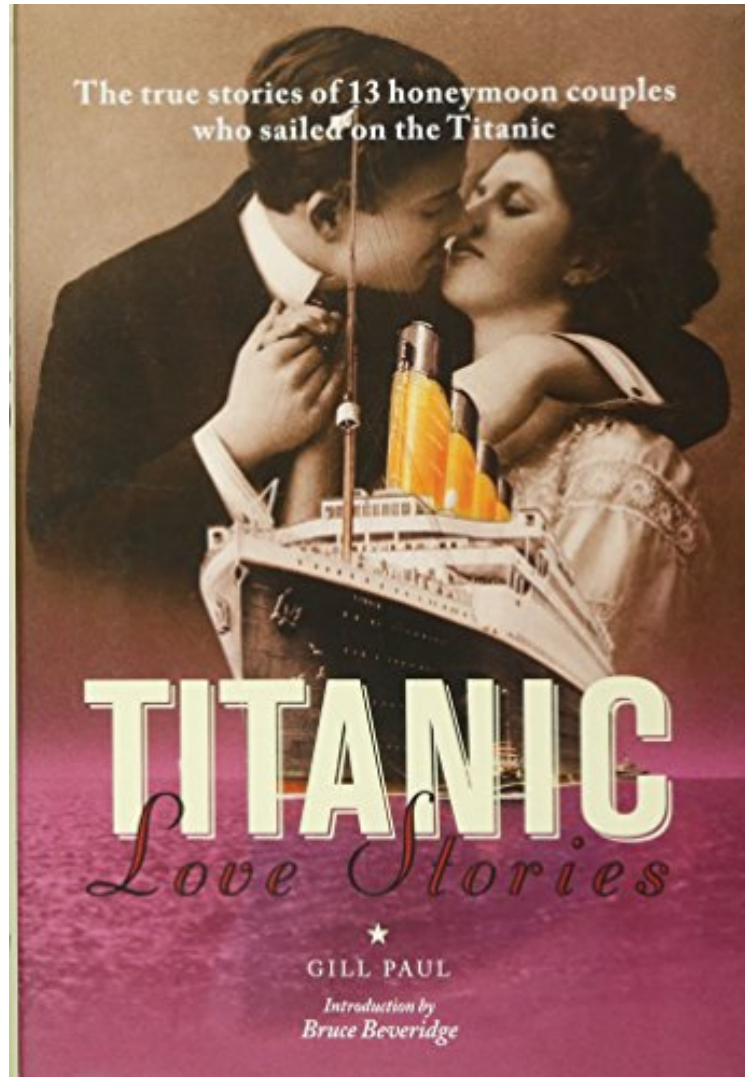

The author does an excellent job of interspersing their stories with fascinating facts about the ship, as well as anecdotes that have come down through the decades. He gives a good variation of couples as well. Some were millionaires: others were struggling-and hoping for a better life in America.

Some of their stories end hopefully, while others ended tragically-but none of the survivors were ever the same afterwards. And there were Edward and Ethel Beane, who had saved up for six years to get married and lost everything on the Titanic. They survived, but refused ever to talk about what happened to them.
