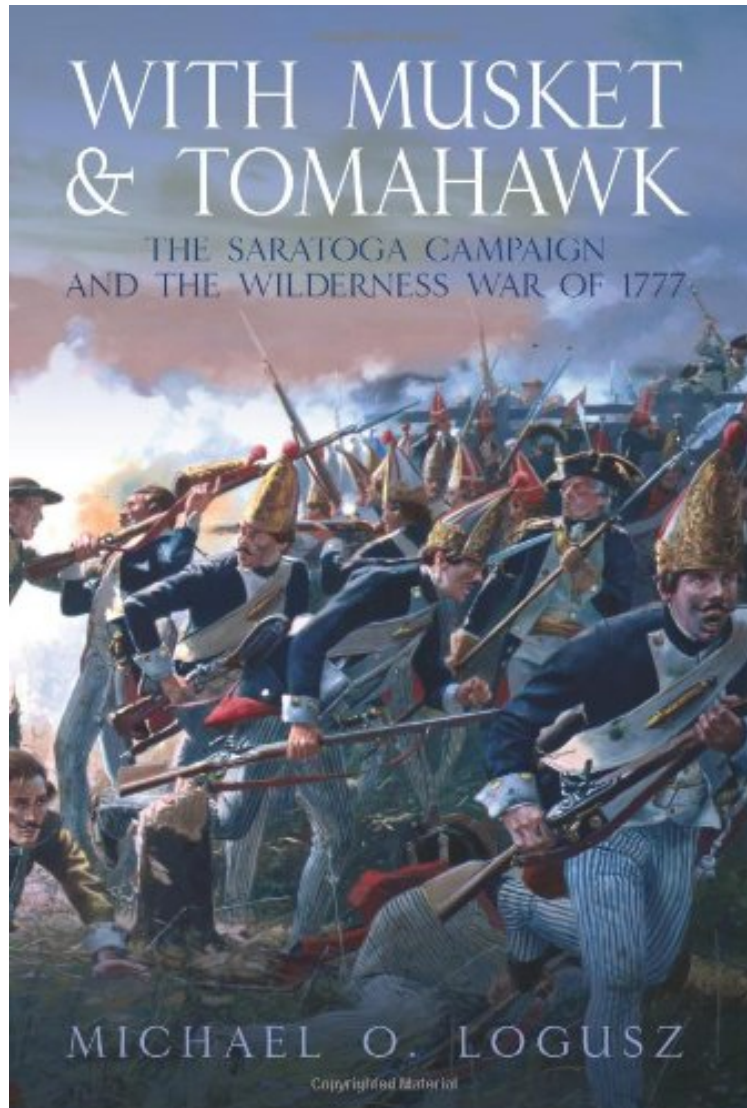

historians believe that the central question of American independence was settled, in a practical fashion, during the series of battles waged in central New York in 1777. Prominent among these was the Battle of Saratoga where American colonials defeated a British Army from Canada under the command of John Burgoyne. The victory of the patriots at Saratoga in late 1777 has traditionally been cited as leading directly to America's alliance with France in 1778. The many phases of this months-long campaign are aptly described in a book entitled *With Musket and Tomahawk* by Michael O. Logusz, (Havertown PA: Casemate Publishing, 2010). Logusz' account of the campaign (details, anecdotes, and first person reports) is one of the most interesting and gripping that I have read. His battlefield descriptions are clear and read like a well-crafted novel. Underneath the umbrella of Saratoga, countless battles and skirmishes were waged from the borders of Canada southward to Ticonderoga, Bennington, and West Point. Heroes on both sides were created by the score, though only one side proved victorious, amid a tapestry of madness, cruelty, and hardship in what can rightfully be called "the terrible Wilderness War of 1777."
